Federal Budget Supports Anti-Racism Strategy

CHES commends the Government of Canada for including in its federal budget, released on March 28th, \$0.6 million ongoing to support Canada's Anti-Racism Strategy to fight all forms of racism, including antisemitism, and \$1.5 million over two years to create a new Anti-Racism, Equity and Inclusion Secretariat to develop federal government policies.
